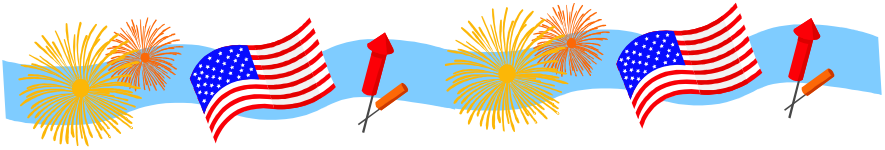

In Memoriam of William "Bill" Robinette

July 21, 1931-May 24, 2007

William "Bill" Robinette died Thursday, May 24, 2007, at his home in Texarkana, TX. Mr. Robinette was born in Leesville, Louisiana, and later moved to Texarkana. He graduated Texas High in 1948, and then went on to Trade School. He retired from Mobil Oil in 1996.

Bill was a dowser, and a member of the American Society of Dowsers. He was a seeker of lost items. He was a treasure hunter. Bill was once President of the Lone Star Treasure Hunters Club in Irving, TX., and later President of the Texarkana Treasure Hunters Club. He loved metal detecting and panning for gold in Colorado. He was a member of the South Texarkana Baptist Church.

He was preceded in death last month by his mother, Elinor Robinette, and by his father, Andrew Robinette in 1975. Survivors include his wife, Katherine Robinette, one daughter, Judy Foster and husband, Russell Foster of Grand Prairie, TX., one grandson, Robin Allen James of Grand Prairie, and one brother, Edwin Robinette and wife, Jeanie Robinette of Marquez, TX.

We will miss Bill as a lifetime member of Lone Star Treasure Hunter's Club, and our heartfelt condolences go to his family.

We are asking you to please help us--help those kids! They are running seriously low of foreign coins that keep this activity going for them during summer camping sessions. In most cases foreign coins are cheap, and sold by most coin dealers by the pound. We ask you to consider helping the many wonderful kids by donating foreign coins to keep this activity alive at the camp. You would be doing an admirable deed for children you'll never meet, but each time they look at the coins they found with a metal detector, they will remember the great time they had in discovering the unknown; and also learning the hobby of treasure hunting. This is an exciting experience that will stay with them all their lives.

It's Better To Be Safe Than Sorry

Everyone should take 5 minutes to read this. It may save your life or save your loved one's life. Because of recent abductions in daylight hours, take time and refresh yourself on these things to do in an emergency situation. This is for you, for your spouse, your children, and everyone you know. It never hurts to be careful in this crazy world we live in.

1. A tip from Tae Kwon Doe. The elbow is the strongest point on your body. If you are close enough to use it, do!
2. Learned from a tourist guide in New Orleans. If a robber asks for your wallet and/or purse, **DO NOT HAND IT TO HIM**. Toss it away from you. Chances are that he is more interested in your wallet and/or purse than you, and he will go for the wallet/purse. **RUN LIKE MAD IN THE OTHER DIRECTION!**
3. If you are ever thrown into the trunk of a car, kick out the back tail lights, and stick your arm out the hole and start waving like crazy. The driver won't see you, but everybody else will. This has saved lives.
4. Women have a tendency to get into their cars after shopping, eating, working, etc., and just sit (doing their checkbook or making a list, etc.) **DON'T DO THIS!** A predator could be watching you, and this is the perfect opportunity for him to get in on the passenger side, and tell you where to go. **AS SOON AS YOU GET INTO YOUR CAR, LOCK THE DOORS AND LEAVE.**
If someone is in the car with a gun to your head, **DO NOT DRIVE OFF!** Instead, gun the engine and speed into anything, wrecking the car. Your air bag will save you. If the person is in the back seat, they will get the worst of it. As soon as the car crashes, bail out and run. It is better than having them take you to a remote location.
5. A few notes about getting into your car in a parking lot or parking garage.
 - A. Be aware. Look around you. Look into your car at the passenger side floor, and in the back seat. As you walk up to the car look underneath it.
 - B. If you are parked next to a big van, enter your car from the passenger door. Most attackers will pull a victim into their vans while they are attempting to get into their cars.
 - C. Look at the car parked on the driver's side of your vehicle, and the passenger side. If a male is sitting alone in the seat nearest your car, you may want to walk back into the mall or work, and get a guard/policeman to walk you back out. It is better to be paranoid than dead.

6. ALWAYS take the elevator instead of the stairs. (Stairwells are horrible places to be alone, and the perfect crime spot.

A. If you see only one person in the elevator, and you feel uncomfortable, wait for the next elevator.

B. If you are alone on an elevator, always stand nearest to the buttons, and push more than one floor button. This way if someone gets on they will not know what floor you are getting off on, and the more floors you stop on the more chance someone else will be outside the elevator door. If someone gets on the elevator that makes you uncomfortable, push the next two floors buttons as if you forgot your floor or push the emergency button.

7. If a predator has a gun, and you are not under his control, ALWAYS RUN! The odds of being hit are 4 out of 100 times. Even then, it most likely will not be fatal. RUN! Preferably in a crouched, zigzag pattern!

8. Most women are always trying to be sympathetic. STOP! It may get you assaulted or killed. Ted Bundy, the serial killer, was a good-looking, well-educated man, who always played on the sympathies of unsuspecting women. He walked with a cane or a limp, and often asked for help into his vehicle or with his vehicle; which is when he abducted his next victim.
